Richard Brown, Street Superintendent, and Doug Davis appeared before the council regarding the one and six year highway and street improvement program.

Council President Peterson recognized Tim Vance for ten years of service to the city of Ogallala.

Councilman Block moved to approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting held February 11, 2014. Councilman Bassett seconded the motion. The following council members voted Yes: Darrell Bassett, Kevin Block, Karl Elmshaeuser, and Rodger Rankin. No: None. Abstain: Pete Peterson. Absent: None. Motion declared carried.

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Councilman Bassett moved to approve the claims payable to West Central Nebraska Development District in the amounts of \$195.00 and 65.00. Brian Vasa, Community Redevelopment Authority Chairman, addressed the council regarding the temporary grading easement and redevelopment agreement for the Wal-Mart development.

Councilman Bassett moved to approve the temporary grading easement by the city of Ogallala, Nebraska ("grantor"), in favor of Wal-Mart real estate business trust, a Delaware statutory trust ("grantee"), and authorize the Council President to sign the agreement. Councilman Block seconded the motion. The following council members voted Yes: Darrell Bassett, Kevin Block, Karl Elmshaeuser, Pete Peterson and Rodger Rankin. No: None. Absent: None. Motion declared carried.

Councilman Elmshaeuser moved to approve the Redevelopment Contract by and between the Community Redevelopment Authority of the City of Ogallala, Nebraska ("CRA"), Wal-Mart Stores, Inc., a Delaware corporation, and Wal-Mart Real Estate Business Trust, a Delaware statutory trust (together "Redeveloper"), and the City of Ogallala, Nebraska (the "City"), and authorize the Council President to sign the Contract. Councilman Rankin seconded the motion. The following council members voted Yes: Darrell Bassett, Kevin Block, Karl Elmshaeuser, Pete Peterson and Rodger Rankin. No: None. Absent: None. Motion declared carried.

Councilman Rankin moved to approve and certify the list of volunteers, as submitted by the Certification Administrator, as qualified participants in the Volunteer Emergency Responder Plan of the City of Ogallala for 2013. Councilman Block seconded the motion. The following council members voted Yes: Darrell Bassett, Kevin Block, Karl Elmshaeuser, Pete Peterson and Rodger Rankin. No: None. Absent: None. Motion declared carried.

Council President Peterson announced that Ordinance 1310 was introduced and read for the first time on January 14, and read for the second time on February 11. Council President Peterson read Ordinance 1310, entitled: An Ordinance rezoning the following described real estate: Lot B, Jehorek's Replat, A Replat of Lot 2, Hillis's Replat, An Administrative Replat Of Lot 3, Ogallala Industrial Addition From A-1 (Agricultural District) To I-1 (Industrial District). Council President Peterson announced that Ordinance 1310 has now been read for the third time.

Councilman Elmshaeuser moved for the final passage of Ordinance 1310. Councilman Block seconded the motion. The President then stated the question: "Shall Ordinance No. 1310 be passed and adopted?" 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Ordinance No. 1310 being attached hereto and, by this express reference, incorporated herein and made a part hereof.

Councilman Bassett introduced Ordinance 1307, entitled: An ordinance amending section 36-102, solid waste management prohibited accumulation and disposal, of the municipal code of the city of Ogallala, Nebraska and moved that the Statutory Rule requiring the reading on three different days be suspended and the ordinance may be read by title and moved for passage at this meeting. Councilman Block seconded the motion. Upon roll call vote, the following Council Members voted "Yes": Darrell Bassett, Kevin Block, Karl Elmshaeuser, Harold Peterson and Rodger Rankin. The following Council Members voted "No": None. Absent: None. Motion declared carried and the Statutory Rule was declared suspended for the consideration of this Ordinance.

Ordinance No. 1307 was read by title and, thereafter, Councilman Bassett moved for the final passage of the Ordinance. Councilman Block seconded the motion. The President then stated the question: "Shall Ordinance No. 1307 be passed and adopted?" The passage and adoption of said Ordinance having been concurred in by a majority of all members of the Council, the President declared the Ordinance adopted and the President, in the presence of the Council, signed and approved the Ordinance and the Clerk attested to the passage and approval of the same and affixed her signature thereto, a copy of said Ordinance No. 1307 being attached hereto and, by this express reference, incorporated herein and made a part hereof.





Please find a copy of the replat and Planning Commission minutes for PLACER Development in your packet. This property is in the area and includes the Antique Mall south of town. The planning Commission has made a recommendation for approval of this replat. Approval of this request by the City Council will involve addressing the request to vacate City right-of-way located to the south of this replat. This is per State Statute 16-611 (*see attached*). City Attorney Josh Wendell has been appraised of this process and will explain the process to the Council at Tuesday's meeting.

The replat states that this right of way is to be vacated. The City Council cannot approve the replat until the City Council has had the discussion on how to vacate the right-of way. There are three options the City Council can decide to make on this proposal.

Option 1: Vacate the street and upon the vacation of the street by the city, the title to such property shall vest in the owners of the abutting property and become a part of such property, one-half on each side thereof.

Option 2: The City reserves title in the ordinance vacating such street. If title is retained by the city, such property may be sold, conveyed, exchanged, or leased upon such terms and conditions as shall be deemed in the best interests of the city.

Option 3: Decide not to vacate the street right of way.

Aaron and I have contacted Greg Hilt, Manager of 21st Century in Ogallala to explain what is being requested and to inform them that there will be a decision made by the City regarding a request to vacate this unimproved street. Mr. Hilt made mention that their primary concern was to maintain access to the north part of 21st Century's property. Mr. Hilt said he would forward this information to the owner of the company for their comment.

Josh Wendell also has appraised Todd Adams of the process for approval as well.

In order to approve the replat as proposed, option 2 will be required.

16-611. Vacation of street or alley; abutting property; how treated.

(1) Upon the vacation of any street or alley by the city, the title to such property shall vest in the owners of the abutting property and become a part of such property, one-half on each side thereof, unless the city reserves title in the ordinance vacating such street or alley. If title is retained by the city, such property may be sold, conveyed, exchanged, or leased upon such terms and conditions as shall be deemed in the best interests of the city.

(2) When a portion of a street or alley is vacated only on one side of the center thereof, the title to such property shall vest in the owner of the abutting property and become part of such property unless the city reserves title in the ordinance vacating a portion of such street or alley. If title is retained by the city, such property may be sold, conveyed, exchanged, or leased upon such terms and conditions as shall be deemed in the best interests of the city.

(3) When the city vacates all or any portion of a street or alley, the city shall, within thirty days after the effective date of the vacation, file a certified copy of the vacating ordinance with the register of deeds for the county in which the vacated property is located to be indexed against all affected lots.

(4) The title to property vacated pursuant to this section shall be subject to the following:

(a) There is reserved to the city the right to maintain, operate, repair, and renew public utilities existing at the time title to the property is vacated there; and

(b) There is reserved to the city, any public utilities, and any cable television systems the right to maintain, repair, renew, and operate water mains, gas mains, pole lines, conduits, electrical transmission lines, sound and signal transmission lines, and other similar services and equipment and appurtenances, including lateral connections or branch lines, above, on, or below the surface of the ground that are existing as valid easements at the time title to the property is vacated for the purposes of serving the general public or the abutting properties and to enter upon the premises to accomplish such purposes at any and all reasonable times.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof by publishing one time in the Keith County News and posting at the City Hall Administration Building. Notice of this meeting was simultaneously given to the Chairperson and to all members of the Planning Commission. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the Notice to the Chairperson and to all members of the Planning Commission of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public. The Chairperson of the Planning Commission stated this meeting is being convened in accordance with the Open Meetings Act and acknowledged a copy of the Open Meetings Act being duly posted in the southeast Corner of Council Chambers.

Motion was made by Schwasinger to approve the minutes of the last meeting of January 7th, 2014. Larington seconded the motion. There was no discussion. All members present voted "Yes". Motion was carried.

Ted Weincek was present to make a request to place a dwelling on his property located at 223 Road East 85. Ted is proposing to construct a new dwelling on this lot that is zoned C-4 (Interstate Highway Business District). The City code that allows the process of a special exception to be approved is 44-803(5). Ted has been informed about portions of this property being in a flood zone and the need for the foundation to be elevated above the flood elevation. Notice of this meeting outlining this request has been sent to all adjacent property owner within 100 feet of the subject property. None of the adjacent property owners were present at this meeting.

The process for approval of this request is through the special exception process. The City code governing special exception requests is as follows:

44-1503. Special exceptions.

(1) Generally. Upon application, pursuant to the provisions of this municipal code, the Council, upon receiving the recommendation of the Planning Commission, shall grant or refuse special exceptions in accordance with the following standards and the intent of this chapter. A written notice of the public hearing stating the time, date, and place of the Planning Commission and City Council meeting shall be sent to all property owners of record within 100 feet of the subject property, said notice to include the type of special exception being requested, prior to the request of special exception being considered. In addition, a notice, in sign form, of the hearing shall be posted in a conspicuous place on or near the property on which such action is pending. The sign shall be placed at least ten days prior to either hearing. In granting any special exceptions, the Council may prescribe and impose appropriate conditions and safeguards, including a specified time limit.

(2) Standards.

(a) Classified special exceptions shall be authorized only if they meet the following standards:

(i) Fire hazard. The use shall not include any activity involving the use or storage of flammable or explosive material unless protected by adequate firefighting and fire-suppression equipment and by such safety devices as are normally used in the handling of any such material.

(ii) Noise. The use shall not include noise which is objectionable due to volume, frequency, or beat unless muffled or otherwise controlled.

(iii) Vibration. The use shall not include vibration which is discernible without instruments on any adjoining lot or property.

(iv) Air pollution. The use shall not involve any pollution of air by flying ash, dust, vapors, or other substances which are harmful to health, animals, vegetation, or other property or which can cause soiling, discomfort, or irritation.

(v) Odors. The use shall not involve any malodorous gas or matter which is discernible on any adjoining lot or property.

(vi) Glare. The use shall not involve any direct or reflected glare that is visible from any adjoining property or from any public street, road, or highway.

(vii) Traffic hazard. The use shall not involve any activity substantially increasing the movement of traffic on public streets unless procedures are instituted to limit traffic hazards and congestion.

(viii) Overtaxing of public utilities and facilities. The use shall not involve any activity substantially increasing the burden on any public utilities or facilities, unless provision is made for any necessary adjustments.

(ix) Character of neighborhood. The use shall not involve any activity not in character with the majority of the uses in the neighborhood unless, by design, setback, nature of operation, and other devices, the character of the neighborhood will be maintained.

(x) General welfare of the community. The use shall not involve any activity which adversely affects the general welfare of the community.

(xi) Conformity with Comprehensive Plan. The use shall be in conformance with the Comprehensive Plan.

The Planning Commission determined the request met the criteria outlined in City Code.

A motion was made by Davis to recommend the City Council approve a request for special exception to use property for purposes of locating a single family dwelling in a C-4 Interstate Highway Business District. Said dwelling is proposed is located at 223 Road East 85, legally described as Lot 5, Martin's First Sub Replat. Schwasinger seconded the motion. There was no discussion. All members present voted "Yes". Motion was carried.

Todd Adams was present for a request to replat property south of Ogallala. The property is located by the Antique Mall. Owners of the subject property is PLACER Development. The purpose of the replat is to develop two existing lots into three lots and dedicate a City Street which will traverse between Lot 2 and Lot 3 as shown on the replat. This plat also vacates an unimproved portion of City Street right-of-way located directly north and adjacent to 21st Century Equipment.

A portion of this replat is within the 100 year flood zone which means that if a structure is built, it will have to be elevated so the lowest floor is one foot above flood elevation. I

The Planning Commission was provided a copy of the replat and maps explaining the proposal. Copies of the replat was also shown to local utility companies, namely NPPD, Source Gas and City water and sewer to which it was concluded that the proposed lots are currently served by water, sewer, electric and gas. The property is zoned as C-4 (*Interstate Highway Business District*). There is no minimum or maximum lot size for this district. There are no plans for improving the street (*Opportunity Drive*) at this time. This street is being dedicated for future development purposes.

Question was asked why the City street right-of-way on the south edge of the proposed replat was proposed to be vacated. Todd Adams answered that this street right-of-way is currently unimproved. If improved, there would be significant drainage problems to contend with. In vacating the right-of-way to the south, PLACER is proposing to dedicate a new right-of-way (*Opportunity Drive*) that will be an extension of the Highway entrance west of the property.

A motion was made by Bryant to recommend the City Council approve a request for approval of PLACER Development Replat No. 2 of PLACER Development Replat No. 1 of Tract # 2 of the Replat of Mueller & Mueller Corp. Second Subdivision of Ogallala, Keith County, Nebraska. Motion was seconded by Malone. There was no discussion. All members present voted "Yes". Motion was carried.

With no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned at 8:00 P.M.

Code Enforcement: Officer Eric Troxel is the Code Officer for Ogallala. While many of the categories we keep track of maintain from year to year, we had another 5 year high in Dogs Impounded, albeit by one. Animal Enforcement




Other Code Enforcement



Overall, Calls for Service were up about 1% for 2013.



NIBRS

NIBRS stands for The National Incident-Based Reporting System. NIBRS is a system in which agencies collect data on each single crime occurrence. NIBRS data comes from local, state, and federal automated records' systems. NIBRS collects data on each single incident and arrest within 22 offense categories made up of 46 specific crimes called Group A Offenses. For each of these offenses coming to the attention of law enforcement, specific types of facts about each crime are reported. An offense is Cleared by arrest, citation, or referral for prosecution. There may be a warrant issued for a crime, but the case is not Cleared until the suspect is arrested. It is important to remember that this list does not include calls such as Ordinance Calls and Minor Violations.





Training

Officers of the Ogallala Police Department attended 574 hours of training in 2013. This was up from 499 hours in 2012. 57 hours of this training was in the form of monthly department meetings. Training consisted of a HSI/ICE Presentation, DEA Basic Narcotics Investigation, Active Shooter Webinar, Youth Protection Training, Child Passengers Seat Update, Street Crimes Seminar, Physical Vulnerability Assessment of Schools, Protect Our Children Conference, POAN/NSA Conference, Safe Kids Nebraska Child Care Car Seat Training, FLO Officer Training, Interview & Interrogation, Mass Shooter Response Tactics, Grade Crossing Accident Investigation, and Taser Instructor.

Impound

In June of 2008, the City of Ogallala established a City Impound. Since that time the City Impound has housed vehicle from arrests made in Ogallala by the Ogallala Police Department and Nebraska State Patrol. The impound has generated decent income for the city since its creation.

Total profit for 2013 was \$1,930.00 with 3 vehicles that will be auctioned soon.

Major Cases

On February 7, 2013, Officer was called to a suspicious person in the 100 Block of Prospector Drive. After investigation, 22 year old Nicholas Bornschein of North Platte, was placed under arrest for Possession of Stolen Property (Dog), Obstructing a Police Officer, Resisting Arrest, and Criminal Impersonation. Bornschein was transported and housed at the Keith County Jail.

On April 15, 2013, Officer was called to Wendy's, 103 Pony Express, for a theft by employee. After investigation, 38 year old, William Dickinson of Ogallala was arrested for Theft by Unlawful Taking over \$1500, Possession of Marijuana Less Than One Ounce, and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Dickinson was transported to the Keith County Jail and turned over to jail staff.

On April 29, 2013, officers received information that a subject on probation was selling drugs. Officer contacted subject's probation officer and was advised to locate the subject and search. After investigation Officers arrested 27 year old female resident of Ogallala, Linda Breese, and 21 year old male resident of Ogallala, Tim Wade, for Possession of Methamphetamine with Intent to Distribute and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Both subjects were jailed.

On May 25, 2013, officers were called to North Western Court #24 concerning a Burglary that happened over the weekend. During the investigation Officers followed several leads and located stolen items at an Ogallala Residence. 3 subjects were arrested in connection with the Burglary, a 34 year old Ogallala White Male named Patrick Gibson, a 32 year old Ogallala White female named Sabrina Heffley, and a 27 year old Ogallala White Female named Lyn Rehn.

On June 10, 2013, Officer was called to the 600 Block of West D for a male subject attempting to gain entrance to a residence. After investigation, 29 year old Brian Reyna of Ogallala was placed under arrest for Terroristic Threats and Disturbing the Peace. Reyna was transported to the Keith County Jail where he was booked and housed.

On July 1, 2013 an officer was called to the PD to speak with a juvenile. The juvenile advised that she had been in a lengthy sexual relationship with an older man. Upon an investigation 35 yrs. old Charles Gove of Ogallala was placed under arrest for 3rd Degree Sexual Assault of a Child. He was transported to the Keith County Jail.

On July 26, 2013, Officers received information about a wanted person that was currently in the 700 Block of East O. Officers attempted to make contact with the subject but the subject refused to comply. After a brief incident, officers placed 23 year old Bradley L Peterson under arrest for a Parole Warrant, Use of a Deadly Weapon to Commit a Felony, Possession of a Deadly Weapon by a Prohibited Person and Resisting Arrest. Peterson was booked into the Keith County Jail where he was housed.

On August 11, 2013 at approximately 1200 hrs. Officer received information of a narcotics violation. Upon investigation officers arrested 34 year old Ogallala Resident Jason Hornkohl for Possession of a Controlled Substance and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Officers also arrested Brandi Sanchez of Ogallala for Obstructing a Police Officer, Tampering with Physical Evidence and Being Under the Influence of a Controlled Substance. Both subjects were transported to the Keith County Jail where they were housed.

On August 25, 2013, several individuals from the area were arrested for conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine and possession with the intent to distribute methamphetamine. During the investigation, more than three pounds of methamphetamine and \$8,000 cash were seized. United States Attorney Deborah R. Gilg released the names of the 17 people that were arrested. They were: Luis Enrique Miramontes-Arteaga, Andres Barraza, J. Merced Rodriguez Barajas, Ruben Avila Barraza, Jesus German-Diaz, Johnny Martinez, Anisha Martinez, Anthony Weinrich, Mark Piper, Jacklynn Walker, Darren Relerford, Chris Hackbart, Bobby Griffin, Kirsten Griffin, Sharon Kay Tyler, Minnie Beth Donner and Linda Breese. The arrests were the result of a long-term investigation by FBI, Nebraska State Patrol, Ogallala Police Department, North Platte Police Department, CODE Task Force, WING Task Force, Keith County Sheriff's Office, Keith County Attorney's Office, Cheyenne County Attorney's Office, Homeland Security Investigations, Deuel County Sheriff's Office, Phillips County Colorado Sheriff's Office, Holyoke Colorado Police Department, Eastern Colorado Plains Drug Task Force and the United States Attorney's Office.

On August 30, 2013 during the execution of a search warrant, OPD located some illegal narcotics and paraphernalia. As a result of the investigation, KIMBERLY CROWE of Ogallala was arrested for POSSESSION OF A CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE (METHAMPHETAMINES), POSSESSION OF MARIJUANA < 1 OZ, and POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA, and THOMAS PIERCE of Ogallala was cited for POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA and POSSESSION OF MARIJUANA < 1 OZ.

On September 6, 2013 officers were called to Ogallala Community Hospital reference a prior Sexual Assault. After the investigation Officer arrested a 19 year old male resident of Ogallala, Patrick Horton, for Sexual Assault 1st Degree. Horton was jailed.

On October 3, 2013 at about 1:20 am, a male subject came to the Keith County Jail to turn himself in for a domestic disturbance between him and his ex-girlfriend. As a result of the investigation, 26 year old ERNEST LOUIS CARLSON III of Ogallala was arrested and jailed on the charges of 1ST DEGREE FALSE IMPRISONMENT; TERRORISTIC THREATS, and 3RD DEGREE DOMESTIC ASSAULT.

On November 11, 2013 Officer received a call for theft of \$1004.66 from KFC/Taco Bell, located in the 500 block of East A South. Upon an investigation 28 yrs. old Ashley Naranjo of Ogallala was arrested for Theft.

On November 20, 2013 Officers were called to Kwik Stop for a male that had been assaulted and was now requiring medical attention. Officer learned that the assault happened in the 200 block of East 1 after the male was transported to the Ogallala Community Hospital. The suspect was not located and report forwarded to the CA for a warrant. Warrant issued 112213 and Officers arrested 37 year old Meliton Sandoval Jr. an Ogallala male resident for 3rd Degree Assault, False Imprisonment, Terrorist Threats, and Criminal Mischief and transported him to the Keith County Jail.
